PODCAST TRANSCRIPT

Controversial decisions

Tim (Liverpool fan)

Um, that's a good question. I'd probably go for the 2006 World Cup final, Italy against France. As you know, Zidane did the **head butt**, which was not actually **caught** by the referee, but was caught by video cameras and the fourth official saw it and he then informed the referee who then **produced the red card**. So for a couple of reasons really, one is still now FIFA doesn't allow video technology but they somehow introduced **surreptitiously** into that final. And I was **rooting for** France to win, and because of Zidane's departure they lost on penalties.

James (Manchester City fan)

I think one of the worst refereeing decisions I've ever seen was back in 1996, and it was a Manchester derby when City were winning 1-0.
